

about the Clinton Fellowship

The William J. Clinton Fellowship for Service in India gives a select group of young American professionals the opportunity to serve with Indian non-governmental organizations (NGOs) for ten months. The program is as an exchange of technical skills and intellectual resources which aims to build the capacity of Indian NGOs while developing American leaders with a deep understanding of, and continued commitment to, India.

Since 2001, 178 Americans have worked with over 90 Indian NGOs through the Fellowship.

The Clinton Fellowship is a life-altering experience for the Fellows. For most, the profound lessons learned while working with marginalized communities in India stays with them and influences their professional trajectories, as change makers and social entrepreneurs in the US and around the world. For some, the experience of applying their skills, ingenuity and initiative to creating solutions in an Indian NGO gives them a sense of their own impact in enabling social change. For others, the greatest takeaway is learning to understand and adapt to a culture vastly different from their own. A number of Fellows have chosen to stay on in India at the end of their tenure with the Fellowship so that they can continue the hands-on development work that they began with AIF.

The Clinton Fellows, who stem from diverse educational and professional backgrounds, are linked in their desire to help unearth India's potential. The Gandhian essence of the Fellowship calls upon a sense of commitment and self reliance in its Fellows as well as a deep desire to help others empower themselves.

The 23, 2008-09, Clinton Fellows are an exceptionally qualified and diverse group, selected through a rigorous process conducted by a panel of international development and volunteer service experts from India and the United States. Each Fellow comes with a strong professional and academic background in a variety of development related fields.

ARUN GUPTA

Arun Gupta was placed at Seva Mandir in Udaipur, Rajasthan. During his Fellowship, Arun established a lentil procurement and marketing operation for local, impoverished farmers from the Adivasi region of Kotra Tehsil. His project stands to greatly improve the incomes of hundreds of poor farmers.

VANITHA SIVARAJAN

Vanitha was placed at DHAN in Madurai, Tamil Nadu. She completed a detailed review and assessment of a group of restored water shed tanks operating in Tamil Nadu. Vanitha's work included conducting extensive interviews with the farming communities who benefit from the restored water tanks. DHAN's work on water programs has established Tamil Nadu as a lead innovator in the area of local, sustainable water programs throughout India.



LAURIE MASON

Laurie Mason was placed at Bodh Shiksha Samiti in Jaipur, Rajasthan. Laurie created two comprehensive laboratory manuals to accompany science classes for 9th and 10th grades. She taught portions of physics classes and created detailed science curricula. Laurie also completed an evaluation of Bodh's slum school program in Jaipur by interviewing Bodh school graduates and their families.

CHAD ROBERTSON

Chad's primary goal at Ashram Paryavaran Vidyalaya (APV) at Shree Bhuvaneshwari Mahila Ashram (SBMA) was to broaden awareness and increase the visibility of the school's innovative curriculum. Chad created a communication portfolio for the school, including a website, a documentary film, two recorded albums of the students performing APV songs, and a general brochure for a national and international supporters. He collaborated with past Service Corps Fellows to set up a US-based organization to raise funds for APV. Chad also successfully obtained a grant from Plan International that enabled APV to train students and teachers from 28 government schools in APV's pedagogical techniques.

Chennai, Tamil Nadu

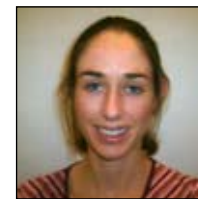

Hyderabad, Andhra Pradesh

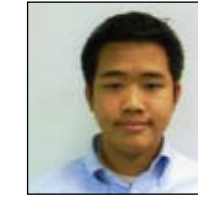
